



Date of birth: 9th September 2016

Patrick comes from a family of nine children, all of whom live at home with their parents. He is the youngest of the children.

The family lives in a two roomed brick built house and their only furniture is a small table and two chairs. This means that, at night, everyone has to sleep on the floor, the children in one of the rooms and the parents in the other.

The house does not belong to them but to their family's clan. They have a small piece of land on which they grow crops for food. Patrick's parents have no other job than farming this land. Once the family has been fed there is never anything left over to be able to sell it to generate some income. Consequently, there has not been the money needed to send Patrick and his siblings to school.

Finally, our PTA noticeboard is located in reception. Please keep an eye on it for updates and information.










What you liked:








What you liked


- Parent Mail, achievement assembly where parents can attend.

What You liked

- The lunchtime and after school clubs are very varied and good to see art clubs have been introduced for those less keen on sport. St Louis is very nurturing and there is a caring environment. St Louis has lots of groups to help personal development so the children can gain responsibility through the school and there are groups to help with SEMH needs.
- Community/friendship encouragement Supportive teachers/ teaching assistants. Range of after school activities. Emotional needs support
- Nice play equipment. Sense of community, strong belonging feeling
- Praising children for their achievements and recognising that by giving them certificate ceremonies.

You told us that you want us to improve

- The school was tidy and cleaner. Class pages were updated. Communion was prepared for in school. Communication improved. Learning expectations were lowered.
- We used IT learning more. Earlier SEND intervention. Address lack of nurture.
- Add more external visits. More 1 to 1 meetings with parents. Authorise time off for holidays during term time. Provide weekly summary of all learning at the end of the week.
- More rewards for good behaviour. Improve the school menu to include hot sandwiches and jacket potatoes. Employ more men. Reduce calls for fundraising.
- Improve the faith focus. Be more kind and welcoming. Changes to Elm teachers this year and
 impact upon class stability. Recognise that the school meal is the only one that children eat in a
 day. Open Treetops up to 6pm. Perform an annual play/performance. Provide parents with
 homework support examples of working out. Include, more competitive activities.
- Add a chess club and greater variety of sports activities. The school is very weak in this area at the moment. Provide free after school clubs for Years 1,2,3 & 4. We could have more frequent communication on children's school progress. There were higher expectations for the children. More inclusive for SEND children. Stop use of dojo points. There was a better balance of expected home learning/homework because unrealistic. Provide more insights about their assessment scores. Provide class timetable etc. The attendance policy needs to be reviewed. Quality of uniforms. Provide after school Maths or Languages Clubs.
- Start to breakfast club earlier. Hygiene more hand washing etc. Provide tuition class for children who need more help.

Things that you want to change

- Provide online school page, where we can check child's homeworks/learning progress anytime. Alternative options
 for after school club rather than just 2 options. Would be more activity on breaktime. They removed the religious
 part and taught facts or allowed students to abstain from the cult behaviors of Catholicism.
- The school was much less authoritarian, rigid and dogmatic about issues such as attendance, uniform and packed lunch contents. It is down to the parents to decide what their children can and should eat over the course of a day, week and month. Children should not be celebrated in assembly for their attendance as it is not their decision whether or not they are in school, it usually depends on unavoidable illness.
- The children go to church far too often and for too long these sessions are boring and often cold. A lot of these
 trips to church, mass in Norwich and the pilgrimage trips should be considered extra-curricular religious experiences
 that are done in a family's free time as part of their own spiritual journey, and this time instead devoted to academic
 study.
- The emphasis on RE is too heavy; this is a thought that has been echoed by many parents I've spoken with, even those that are very active in the church.
- The fundraising non-uniform days should not have a theme attached to them the children love to express themselves in their own clothes and they should be encouraged and given the freedom to do so, particularly if they are having to pay for the privilege.
- We should be allowed to take photos of our children. At the very least, the school could film the show and sell the DVD to parents as they used to do; a great fundraiser and opportunity for parents to keep these precious memories of their small children.
- Weekly school mass. More homework offered for year 5 and 6 even if this was optional.
- Liaison with the parish about First Holy Communion class schedule and supporting this in school with regular discussions and in future years having the lessons in the school premises/day. If forest school continued weekly all year and regular Masses/services were held in the reception class room led by parish Priest/Deacons.
- Better communication from school and not last minute notices.

What we will do:

We will focus on improving:

- Communication . Please let us know if you'd like to work with us to improve this.
- Homework and support for at home
- ♦ School Menu
- Support parent's understanding about our Catholic Faith and the reasons for the way we teach and promote Catholic teaching in our school, as a school within Our Lady of Walsingham Multi Academy Trust. We'll help communicate how the Diocese support preparation for sacraments through our parishes.

What has already happened:

We've held a SEND survey to help further improve the service for children with SEND needs because of what you told us.

Treetops now opens earlier and closes at 6pm . To find out more: <u>St Louis Catholic Academy - Treetops Wraparound</u> <u>by Premier (stlouisacademy.co.uk)</u>

We have appointed a new cook who will be discussing menus with the Food Panel. Let admin know if you'd like to get involved.

We hold termly curriculum meetings with families and the Summer Timetable is available on the school website: <u>St</u> <u>Louis Catholic Academy - Curriculum (stlouisacademy.co.uk)</u>

Governors have been working with staff to improve communication on the school website. Please take a look.

We continue to follow Government Safeguarding and Attendance guidance to keep children safe.

We have continued to expand club offers beyond sport but we cannot fund these as free clubs without making cuts to school staff. To fund such a subsidy. We choose to priortise staffing each class with experienced people instead throughout the school day. We keep costs as low as we can and cancel clubs where we cannot fill them.

We hold Healthy School Status and this is why we promote healthy lunch boxes, like many other schools.
