Key stage 1

Pupils are taught to:

 use their voices expressively and creatively by singing songs and speaking chants and rhymes

- play tuned and untuned instruments musically
- listen with concentration and understanding to a range of high-quality live and recorded music
- experiment with, create, select and combine sounds using the inter-related dimensions of music.

Key stage 2

- Pupils are taught to sing and play musically with increasing confidence and control.
- develop an understanding of musical composition, organising and
- manipulate ideas within musical structures and reproducing sounds from aural memory.

Pupils are taught to:

- play and perform in solo and ensemble contexts, using their voices and playing musical instruments with increasing accuracy, fluency, control and expression
- improvise and compose music for a range of purposes using the inter-related dimensions of music
- listen with attention to detail and recall sounds with increasing aural memory
- use and understand staff and other musical notations
- appreciate and understand a wide range of highquality live and recorded music drawn from different traditions and from great composers and musicians

9 - Pupil Premium and SEND provision

We commit to achieving greater access and more opportunity in music education, identifying and removing barriers, including for children in low-income families and children with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND)

We take action to support increasing access, opportunity, participation, and progression of groups that are currently under-represented in music *by*

- offering PP learners and Young Carers free ukulele tuition in addition to classroom lessons
- encourage participation in choir of PP, Young Carers and SEND learners
- include all children in performances, supporting their physical and wellbeing needs to enable them to perform
- purchase and provide instruments for all children so that this is not a barrier to participation
- providing additional adult support in music lessons where there is an identified need
