Could your child be eligible for Free School Meals?

If your child is in Reception to Year 6, they may be eligible for Free School Meals (FSM). This is different to the Universal Free School Meals scheme under which all children from Reception to Year 2 receive a school dinner. The school receives extra funding for all children eligible for FSM and this is used to subsidise school trips/clubs for these children during the school year. Applications should be made online using the Citizen's Portal via the following link: www.suffolk.gov.uk/free school meals.



Bishop Emeritus Alan Hopes Blesses the Sisters of St Louis Wellbeing Hub

On the 21st March, we celebrated Mass and welcomed Bishop Alan and Sister Blathnaid, who flew over from Dublin. The Sisters of St Louis gave us £100,000 to build this hub as a legacy when they left Newmarket after

many years of service in our parish. With the help of the Diocese, plans were drawn up and the project management has been overseen by Helen Bates, Assistant Director of Schools. The new hub will allow us to better support children with social and emotional needs, their families and the support teams working with them. The multi-purpose space provides a confidential area for counselling, a sensory space for calming, a quiet retreat to hold specialist support meetings and an area for small group therapies.

Sister Blathnaid gifted the school two books detailing the life of the Sisters and this includes photographs of our school at the time that it was operated by them. Bishop Alan delighted in



visiting the Mustard Seed Kitchen because his charity funded half of the earlier building project.

Parent Survey 2024 Feedback

Thank you for taking part in a bumper year of surveys.

The annual survey ran throughout December 2024 up to the 11th January 2025. This survey followed soon after the parent survey led by the RE Inspection Team, who visited in November 2024. Initially, there was a low response to the Parent Survey 2024 but additional messages were sent out and responses rose to sixty seven. However, in previous years, responses have been between one hundred and three to one hundred and ten. Ofsted also sent out a survey that had similar responses to this St Louis one.

In response for how we can improve, Governors have met together and agreed to the following:

There were a number of parent requests that Governors discussed and decided further action would not be taken and their reasons for this are explained:

Term length reduced: this is set by Government and falls outside of the school or Trust's discretion. **School cleanliness**: the school site is well managed, clean and tidy. External reviews have not identified any issues relating to cleanliness.


First Holy Communion preparation and church and school collaboration: this is led by the Parish. The Parent RE Forum established in December 2024 seeks to improve communication about Sacrament preparation and a better understanding about the church and school partnership.

French club at lunchtime: with the shortening of lunchtimes, French has moved to after school club because it is not feasible to complete the lesson in the time available.


Fordham Road and Rayes Lane traffic and highway management: the school regularly communicates with Suffolk County Council about Fordham Road and Rayes Lane but has no jurisdiction over road cleaning and barrier installation. However, the school was able to petition for improved barriers between horses and pedestrians. The County Council was asked to consider installing a barrier at the time of the Rayes Lane improvements.

Children on the school website to cease: families have the option to have their child's face excluded from published images.

It is therefore impossible for us to know if the pesto in a child's packed lunch contains nuts or not. As a result, we are asking that you **DO NOT include pesto in your child's packed lunch or snacks**.

Please also keep an eye out for "hidden" nuts in products, such as bakewell tarts, battenburg cakes and madeleines, all of which have come into school in children's lunch boxes.

Children and Horse Safety In Rayes Lane and Fordham Road

Check for horses even when the horse crossing lights are on green;

Walk behind the horse safety barriers on Rayes Lane;

Always hold your child's hand crossing the road;

Walk quietly near to the horses;

Dismount your scooter or bike near the horses;

Cross from Waitrose calmly and quickly, looking all around for oncoming horses;

Older children need reminding to be aware of their surroundings and not their phone screens.

Crossing Rayes Lane and Fordham Road Safely

Where there is a pavement or footway, use it. Take care when crossing cycle and horse lanes on the road. Cyclists may be travelling quietly but can be faster than other traffic. If you are looking after someone younger than you, always hold their hand when on the road.

Remember to look both ways.

- 1. Find a safe place to cross.
- 2. Stop just before you get to the kerb.
- 3. Look all around for traffic and listen.
- 4. If traffic (horses too) are coming, let them
