



Skill Story

This term, our main focus is speaking and listening. The parent portal provides families with many resources to support this skill in the home. We are not expecting classes to achieve beyond Step 4 at present and younger students will be lower down the steps. In nursery, we are familiarising children with the symbols for the skills and beginning to talk about what good listening and speaking sound like. In the parent area, you will find daily challenges to try at home. These are voluntary activities that you may choose to access.

Your child may enjoy the short videos that target step 0 upwards in simple stages. Children start year 7 at Step 6 or 7 and so we are focusing up to step 4 only for older children at the moment.

If you do wish to look at the resources at home, please focus on speaking and listen. Our major focus up to Easter will be these two skills with the addition of teamwork. Whilst we'll talk about all the skills, they are built upon slowly to fully embed them.





School Council speak out

School Councillors have been busy sharing their views and representing their peers. They met Trina to discuss improvements to the healthy school menu and the packed lunch policy and offered suggestions for future menu planning. This consultation work is in addition to the addition to the Parent Panel and School Dietician consultation.

School also welcomed PCSO Bill Butcher, the Newmarket **Town Police Community Support** Officer. His role is fully funded by the Town Council initially for two years. Although he is Town Council Funded, he is employed by Suffolk Constabulary and remains attached to the Newmarket Police Safer Neighbourhood Team, as an additional resource. He is busy engaging with our School Council to get some feedback on what pupils see as issues which affect them and also their school and what could or should be happening to provide solutions. Children have been given an opportunity to ask him any questions too. He plans to meet with the School Council once a term and ultimately provide feedback to the Town Council to shape the future of The Town.



FREE SCHOOL MEALS (Year Reception to Year 2 are always free)

Your child in Year 3 and above will get free school meals if you receive any of the following:

- **Income Support** •
- Income-based Job Seeker's Allowance •
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance •
- Guarantee element of State Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit but no element of Working Tax Credit and have an annual income (as assessed by HM • Revenues & Customs) that does not exceed £16,190
- If you are supported under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999 •
- Working Tax Credit during the four-week period immediately after your employment finishes or after you • start to work fewer hours per week
- Universal Credit (provided you have an annual net earned income of no more than £7,400 (£616.67 per

Our Catholic Faith in School





ALL SAINTS DAY

All Saints' Day is a Christian holiday. It is celebrated on November 1 in the Roman Catholic Church and on the first Sunday after Pentecost in the Eastern Orthodox Church. (Pentecost takes place 50 days after Easter.) It is officially known as the Sunday of All Saints in the Orthodox Church and as the Solemnity of All Saints in the Roman Catholic Church.

All Saints' Day celebrates all the Christian saints. Saints are holy people who are believed to be very close to God. Roman Catholics and Eastern Orthodox Christians believe that saints have special powers to help people. People celebrate the saints by lighting candles and going to church.

In some places, people bring flowers to cemeteries and clean the graves of their loved ones for All Saints' Day. For instance, in Louisiana people clean and paint tombs and put flowers on the graves. A priest then blesses the graves. The state of Louisiana has such a large Roman Catholic population that November 1st is a state holiday.

No one is sure how All Saints' Day came to be or why it falls on the days it does. Some people think it started as a feast day for martyrs on May 13. (A martyr is someone who dies for his or her religious beliefs.) This may have started as early as AD 359. In the late 500s and early 600s, the Sunday of the Nativity of the Saints was recorded as taking place the week after Pentecost.

Another theory is that All Saints' Day came from Ireland. In the oldest Irish book on martyrs, *Félire of Oengus*, a feast of all saints on November 1 is possibly mentioned. Also, the Irish often designated the first day of the month for important feasts. November 1 is the beginning of the Celtic winter, so it is possible that the feast of all saints occurred on the same day. The celebration of All Saints' Day on November 1 may have passed to England and then on to the European continent. In the 700s Pope Gregory III dedicated a chapel in Saint Peter's, Rome, on November 1 in honor of all saints. A later pope ordered that all Catholics should observe the day on November 1.


