School Uniform Survey

Thank you to all the families who suggested changes to the school uniform. The school governors made suggestions based upon your feedback and then presented two choices:

Remain with existing or

Change to revised uniform.

The votes were as follows:

Remain 62.7%

Change 37.3%

FREE SCHOOL MEALS



If you, or your child, receive certain benefits, you may be eligible for free school meals from **Year 3 and above**. Check now with Suffolk County Council. Children in Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 are eligible for free school meals regardless of household income.

Your child will get free school meals if you receive any of the following:
Income Support
Income-based Job Seeker's Allowance

Income-pased Job Seeker's Allowance
Income-related Employment and Support
Allowance
Guarantee element of State Pension Credit

Child Tax Credit but no element of Working Tax Credit and have an annual income (as

assessed by HM Revenues & Customs) that does not exceed £16,190
If you are supported under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
Working Tax Credit during the four-week period immediately after your employment finishes or after you start to work fewer hours

Universal Credit (provided you have an annual net earned income of no more than £7,400 (£616.67 per month), as assessed by earnings from up to three of your most recent assessment periods).

Some Mini Vinnies may choose to focus on their local community while others will also have an international focus. To find out more:



Geographers in Rowan Class

Rowan class have been studying their local area and drawing maps this term. We base our St Louis Geography curriculum on the Primary Knowledge Curriculum.

Year 1 are gaining knowledge and understanding of Spatial Sense and covering:

- 1. Aerial Views
- 2. Maps
- 3. Location
- 4. Compass Points
- 5. Drawing maps

The principles of our knowledge rich curriculum are that:

- · Knowledge is valued and specified
- · Knowledge is well-sequenced
- · Knowledge is taught to be remembered.

We are finding that children are rising to the challenge of being exposed to this detailed learning from a young age.





Our School Council

This term, classes held elections for their new school councilors, with each class choosing a Councilor and Deputy. Beech Class used a ballot box with polling clerks ready to collect secret votes.

Each class used the elections to talk about democracy. The School Council will be supported by Mrs Brankin. Our School Council brings forward all their class views and ideas to improve the school.

The first meeting of the year coincided with our wear red event to Show Racism the Red Card.

We look forward to hearing all the great ideas that classes wish to share.

Phonics and Early Reading

Mrs Baldwin leads early reading up to Year 1 and Mrs White leads reading from Year 2 upwards. Reception children are now reading phrases, spelling and writing CVC words. The children use the displays to help them with their letter formation and spelling. We use our fingers to sound talk when we spell the CVC words. They form their letters early and will be writing words and sentences during the year.














St Louis Sisters Nest

We have been fortunate to have £100,000 from the Sisters of St Louis, gifted to the Diocese for the development of a wellbeing hub in our school. This is advancing steadily with ground investigations completed in the courtyard area beside the school library. Building control are currently reviewing the plans.









The new room will be used for pastoral work with children, provide a quiet space for children needing a small and calm area to focus in and it will be an area that meetings with families can take place. We are blessed to be given this generous gift that the Sisters request is used to support mental wellbeing. Subject to planning approval, we hope to see development start in this school year.

Whole School writing task: The Day the Crayons Quit;





TIPS TO STAY SAFE ONLINE

There are lots of things you can do to keep yourself safe online.

• Think before you post

Don't upload or share anything you wouldn't want your parents, carers, teachers or future employers seeing. Once you post something, you lose control of it, especially if someone else screenshots or shares it.

• Don't share personal details

Keep things like your address, phone number, full name, school and date of birth private, and check what people can see in your privacy settings. Remember that people can use small clues like a school logo in a photo to find out a lot about you.

• Watch out for phishing and scams

Phishing is when someone tries to trick you into giving them information, like your password. Someone might also try to trick you by saying they can make you famous or that they're from a talent agency. Never click links from emails or messages that ask you to log in or share your details, even if you think they might be genuine. If you're asked to log into a website, go to the app or site directly instead.

• Think about who you're talking to

There are lots of ways that people try to trick you into trusting them online. Even if you like and trust someone you've met online, never share personal information with them like your address, full name, or where you go to school. Find out more about grooming.

• Keep your device secure


Make sure that you're keeping your information and device secure


Never give out your password

You should never give out your password or log-in information. Make sure you pick strong, easy to remember passwords.

Cover your webcam

Some viruses will let someone access your webcam without you knowing, so make sure you cover your webcam whenever you're not using it.
