The 8th March 2021 was a very happy day because we finally welcomed all our children back into school. It took little time to settle everyone back into their learning routines because many families have been brilliant in home learning support throughout the latest

have been brilliant in home learning support throughout the latest lockdown. This has helped reduce the potential for many children falling significantly behind in meeting their age-related expectations in reading, writing and maths. However, we can't expect every child to be on track in their learning and staff are busy delivering targeted intervention support every afternoon throughout the school whilst maintaining mornings for teachers to focus upon delivering high quality reading, writing and maths lessons. We also recognise the need for additional pastoral support to be offered to learners and we have trained a team to be mental health first aiders and some staff have been developed to use drawing and talking skills to support children to express themselves. In Autumn term, you told us that school did not offer a good range of clubs and so we've been busy developing new opportunities for children before and after school and during lunchtimes. We plan to begin to introduce these in Summer Term. Children have shown great understanding of the importance of Lent and it has been wonderful to experience the prayer life in school, give to others and to prepare for Easter as a school community. I wish you a safe and restful Easter.

Spotlight on UKS2



Upper Key Stage 2 is made up of year groups 5 and 6: Hazel, Larch and Maple classes. We are situated upstairs in the original Victorian building and are the oldest two year groups in primary

school, before pupils move onto their secondary schools. In addition to building on the learning in LKS2, we concentrate on preparing children to become the more independent and responsible learners they will need to be in secondary school. Whilst the recent school-closure period was difficult in so many ways, some of our pupils have clearly become more independent, more re-

sourceful and more resilient as a result. We were extremely impressed with how well all our children coped with their learning over the past few months - whether at home or in school - but it was wonderful to welcome them all back on 8th March. They were so happy to see their friends, we were so happy to see them and we all feel like we are now situated back where we belong!

At the end of KS2 (Year 6) pupils are tested as part of the programme of National Curriculum tests (sometimes known as 'SATs'). These tests cover English (Reading Comprehension, and Grammar, Punctuation and Spelling) and Mathematics (Arithmetic and Reasoning). Teachers' assessments for writing are also submitted in June. The National Curriculum tests are externally marked, with results for each school published in the Department for Education performance tables. The NC tests usually take place at the beginning of May, with results published at the beginning of July. Due to the extended period of school closure this year however, these National Curriculum tests have been cancelled for this May. Class teachers will still be assessing pupils' progress and attainment in both years 5 and 6 and this information will be included in the Year 6 children's transition exchange with secondary schools.

Like LKS2, we also base our learning around a termly 'theme'. This theme is led by our choice of English books (through the Power of Reading scheme), which we use as the basis for our English reading comprehension, writing, grammar and punctuation teaching and learning. The themes this year have been Leadership through History (Autumn term) and Britain at War (Spring term). In the Summer term we will be studying Migration, What does it mean to be British. We have selected the novel Journey to the River Sea by Eva Ibbotson and a book of poetry called Locomotion by Jacqueline Woodson to support our learning. We continue to teach RE, Science, History, Geography, French, PE, Art, Computing, Music and PSHCE (Personal Social Health and Citizenship Education) following the national curriculum guidelines. However, we also endeavour to offer pupils a much wider curriculum, including a broad range of activities like participating in live science presentations, exploring the energy activity of our solar panels, Playmaker training, Bikeability, Camping weekend, Mini Vinnies and much more!

In Year 6, all pupils are awarded a role of responsibility. These include prefects, librarians, dance leaders, play rangers, sports leaders, press and digital officers and head boy and girl. These extra responsibilities contribute towards pupils' service to others and leadership experiences. Towards the end of Year 5, pupils are asked to consider which role may be best suited to them for the forthcoming year. They then write a letter of application to Mrs Blakeley and myself (as KS2 Leader). In addition, Year 6 pupils are able to apply to become House Captains. This involves leading their house in sports and fundraising ventures.

Welcome to St Louis Forest School

We are Working with Abbeycroft Explore Outdoor to launch our Forest School. Going forward, every year 2 and 3 children will attend Forest School in the woodland for half a day every fortnight. Over Summer term, year 4 can book a place at the after school Forest Club held on Thursdays.

Mrs Cox has agreed to be our Forest Leader but it will take up to 9 months to train and so

Abbeycroft leaders will work with us for the next year. We plan to train more staff to develop their Forest School skills. The New Economics Foundation (NEF) evaluated the benefits of Forest Schools. Their evaluation suggests: Forest Schools make a difference in the following ways:

Confidence: Children had the freedom, time and space to learn and demonstrate dependence

Social skills: Children gained increased awareness of the consequences of their tions on peers through team activities such as sharing tools and participating in play

Communication: language development was prompted by the children's sensory experiences

Motivation: the woodland tended to fascinate the Children and they developed a keenness to participate and the ability to Concentrate over longer periods of time

Physical skills: these improvements were characterised by the development of physical stamina and gross and fine motor skills

Knowledge and understanding: the Children developed an interest in the natural surroundings and respect for the environment



A group of confident readers are taking part in Reading Gladiator challenges too.








Parent Consultations online: Thank you for attending your online meeting with your class teacher during March. You should now understand if your child is working at their age related expectations for reading, writing, maths and phonics or if they are below or above when compared to schools nationally. We will be focusing upon catch up interventions for those needing extra support whilst stretching learners to progress to working at Greater Depth too.

Your School Council is busy

The school council had a productive meeting which discussed all things concerning the big 'Return to School'. Representatives all agreed that their pupils have settled back into the class well it feels like they never left! As we are getting back into the swing of things we are proposing the introduction of Student Diaries so that pupils can keep track of the day to day happenings and due dates. Representatives have been conscious contributors to CAFOD fundraisers and have been encouraging their pupils to participate and think about how they can give back during Lent. 
